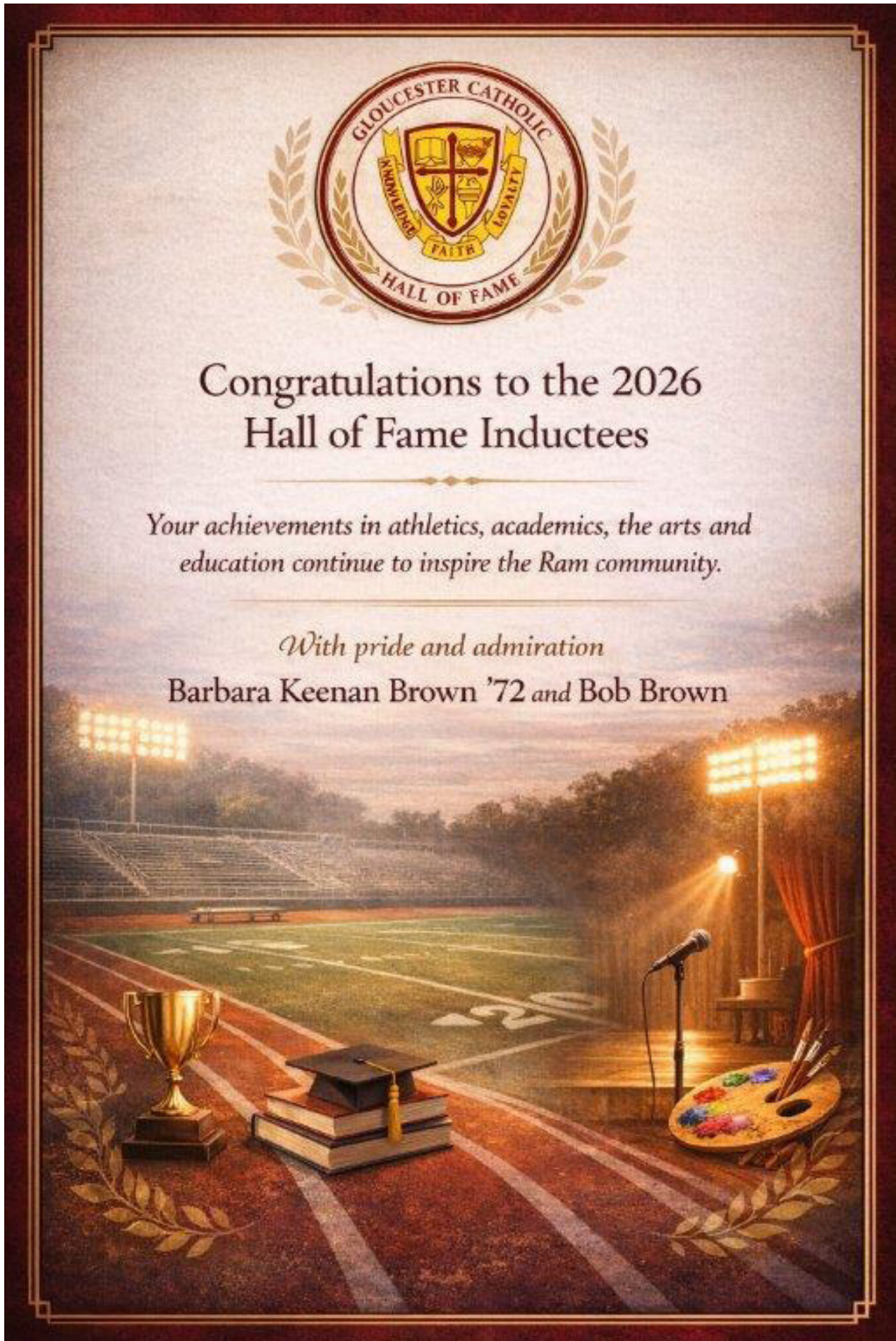

Matt Gaudreau **Gloucester Catholic Class of 2013**

Education: *Boston College*

Career Highlights: *Matt was a top player for Gloucester Catholic and later at Boston College; played several seasons of minor league hockey; served as head coach of Gloucester Catholic ice hockey for 2 years.*

Matt was a terrific hockey player, a fierce and fast competitor who would transform into the friendliest of personalities off the ice.

In 2005, he was inducted into the Gloucester Catholic Hall of Fame in recognition of his contributions as an athlete, coach and a shining example of a life remarkably well-lived. He was a top player at GC and at Boston College and played several seasons of minor league hockey before becoming the head coach at Gloucester Catholic. He was a natural leader.

Matty Gaudreau was also a family man devoted to his wife Madeline and his soon-to-be-born son, Tripp, who arrived four months after his father's death. He was also extraordinarily close to his brother Johnny, sisters Kristen and Katie and his mom and dad.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

Nick Calio

Gloucester Catholic Class of 1961

Education: *Villanova University, 1965*

Career Highlights: *Eastman Kodak Company; GE Aerospace Division; Ownership and Chairmanship of Remcal Products Corporation, Rebling Plastics Company, and Resdel Corporation*

A proud member of the Gloucester Catholic Class of 1961, Nick Calio has exemplified extraordinary generosity and an unmatched commitment to our students. Nick often recalls how his high school experience served as a vital stepping stone to his career as an industry leader in the Delaware Valley.

After graduating from GCHS, Nick earned a degree in Mechanical Engineering from Villanova University and joined the Eastman Kodak Company as an electro-mechanical design engineer. During his two years at Kodak, he was awarded two patents. Nick later returned to the Philadelphia area to work for the GE Aerospace Division before becoming president of a small manufacturing company in South Jersey. From there, he built a distinguished business career that included the ownership and chairmanship of Remcal Products Corporation, Rebling Plastics Company, and Resdel Corporation. In 1993, Nick received a third patent for an electrical battery quick disconnect, which has since become an industry standard used on the vast majority of commercial and military aircraft.

In recognition of his contributions, Villanova University honored Nick with the Meritorious Service Award in 2000 and the Professional Achievement Award for Mechanical Engineering in 2011. Nick and his wife, Rose-lynn, are members of the Villanova 1842 Heritage Society and the Presidents' Club. In 2017, Nick received the Gloucester Catholic High School John and Jackie O'Donnell Award, and he has served on the GCHS Advisory Board for several years.

Nick's commitment to Gloucester Catholic, including sponsoring numerous scholarship programs, underscores his belief in the transformative power of education. As he shares, "I owe so much to Gloucester Catholic and the opportunities it provided to build my career. Roselynn and I are grateful that we can help future students realize their hopes and dreams."

The Calio family's generosity and dedication truly embody the spirit of Gloucester Catholic, and their legacy continues to inspire current and future Ram students.



HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

Dr. Frank Porreca **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1969**

Education: *Seton Hall University, BS; Albert Einstein College of Medicine, M.D.*

Career Highlights: *Founding member of Eastern Vascular Associates; Director of Vascular Surgery, Jack D. Weiler Hospital of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine; Director of Vascular Lab and Attending Surgeon, New York Presbyterian Columbia University Medical Center*

Some kids are nervous or scared about going to the doctor’s office. Others look forward to receiving a lollipop or toy at the end of the appointment. Dr. Frank Porreca just remembers being fascinated by the white coats whenever he had a medical experience as a child.

“I guess you could say I was infatuated with the white coat,” he said. “To me, it represented authority, achievement and respect from your peers. ... So I knew midway through high school that I wanted to pursue a medical career.”

Along with a strong push from his father—a truck driver who encouraged his son to follow a professional calling—and the influence of Gloucester Catholic, Dr. Porreca eventually fulfilled that goal. He credits his teachers, classmates like close friend Dominic Carrera and his basketball coach, Ralph Saquella, for helping him reach his potential.

“When you’re going through all of it, you don’t realize how important those things are,” he said. “But looking back, I can say that’s what built the foundation for me. You don’t get through medical school and you don’t get through residency unless you’re motivated, disciplined and willing to sacrifice. I had mentors who were able to push me and get the best out of me. Those are the things that I look back on from Gloucester Catholic that impacted me.”

An excellent student and three-year starter in basketball at GC, he went on to study pre-med at Seton Hall, graduated summa cum laude in 1973, and later matriculated at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, where he first developed an interest in vascular surgery. Following a rigorous five-year residency in general surgery at Montefiore Medical Center, he completed a vascular surgery fellowship at Pennsylvania Hospital.

Dr. Porreca founded a private practice in New York that thrived for nearly two decades and was then recruited to join Montefiore Medical Center, where he served as Director of Vascular Surgery at Jack D. Weiler Hospital. He oversaw the vascular lab, wound care program and hyperbaric center, and proudly established a new fellowship to train future vascular surgeons in a quicker time frame than in the past.

After 15 years at Montefiore, Dr. Porreca and his team moved to New York Presbyterian Columbia University Medical Center to start a new vascular program, where he stayed until his retirement in 2022.

Now living in Toms River with his wife of almost 53 years, Dr. Porreca loves to golf, read about history and spend time with his son, daughter and three grandchildren. But he is not quite done with medicine, either.

“I feel like with all of my experience—between residency and practice we’re talking about 50 years in this field—I have a lot to give back,” he said. “One of my interests is giving back to younger people and teaching them, training them and getting them ready for the real world. I hope I can continue to do that.”



HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

George Anastasia **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1965**

Education: *Dartmouth University*

Career Highlights: *Crime reporter at The Philadelphia Inquirer, 1974-2012; Renowned author whose books include Blood and Honor: Inside the Scarfo Mob, the Mafia's Most Violent Family, and The Summer Wind: Thomas Capano and the Murder of Anne Marie Fahey*

A few years before discovering his professional calling on the other side of the Atlantic, and well before he ever could have imagined becoming a highly respected journalist, author and expert on organized crime, George Anastasia was a two-sport athlete at Gloucester Catholic in football and baseball. He learned in those sports that talk is cheap, and all that matters is how one performs in between the lines—which he’s carried over to his career ever since.

“It’s the same thing with writing,” he said. “You can go around and talk about what a great reporter you are, but at a certain point you have to sit down at that computer terminal and start writing, and it’s either there or it’s not. That was the lesson from sports and that was the lesson from Gloucester Catholic.”

The oldest of three siblings, Anastasia grew up in Westville and remembers his father reading two newspapers a day. But his own love for the medium didn’t kick in until he was a scholarship student at Dartmouth and spent six months studying abroad in France. Before the days of cell phones and the internet, his only connection to home was reading The International Herald Tribune every day.

After graduating with a French degree, his first job out of college was at The Woodbury Daily Times, where he served as a sportswriter, news reporter and city editor during his tenure before briefly moving to The Courier-Post. He then joined The Philadelphia Inquirer in 1974, where one of his early roles was covering the casino industry in Atlantic City, along with its ties to the mob.

Anastasia’s first book, Blood and Honor, detailed Philadelphia’s notorious Scarfo crime family and cemented his reputation as one of the nation’s most renowned reporters on the subject. The mob became his beat, and he appreciated the opportunity to get creative in his writing and to be given the support of his editors in sniffing out stories.

“I was blessed to be at The Inquirer during the glory days of newspapers,” he said.

A father of two and grandfather of four, Anastasia is now retired from The Inquirer but still writes a magazine column about the mob scene, co-hosts a podcast and will release what he expects to be his final book early next year. He credits his alma mater for giving him the tools to handle each step of his career.

“I think back to the resilience I got from going to Gloucester Catholic,” he said. “That’s what I learned: You don’t ever give up, you don’t stop, and you don’t let anybody else define you. ... We didn’t have a lot of high-tech facilities, but we had a lot of heart and a lot of grit.”

Maureen Coghlan **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1997**

Education: *Georgetown University, BA; Rutgers School of Law – Camden, JD*

Career Highlights: *Trustee of the Association of the Federal Bar of New Jersey, New Jersey Law Journal “Unsung Hero” Honoree, Recognized by Best Lawyers in America for Litigation – Environmental, Co-Chair of Archer & Griener’s New Jersey Local Counsel Practice.*

Maureen Coghlan credits Gloucester Catholic with inspiring her love for the law and her career as a litigator. Whether it was polishing writing skills with Mr. Tom Flynn in freshman English, mastering cause and effect in Chemistry with Mr. Bob Nark, working through equations with Mrs. Anne Heim, or discussing current events with Ms. Mary Ann Saunders in AP History, all these skills helped prepare Maureen for life as a lawyer. While at Gloucester Catholic, Maureen traveled to nationals with the Forensics Team and won a state medal in original oratory, served as Student Director for the school play, and was a National Merit Commended Scholar.

At Georgetown University, Maureen earned her bachelor’s degree majoring in English and minoring in Government and Philosophy. She served as the first women president of Georgetown’s Mu Alpha Chapter of Alpha Phi Omega, the National Service Fraternity, studied at the Villa Le Balze, Georgetown’s Campus in Florence, Italy, and interned at Dateline NBC.

Maureen returned to South Jersey for law school, graduating from Rutgers Law in Camden and serving as a law clerk to the Honorable Renée Marie Bumb, United States District Court for the District of New Jersey, and the Honorable George Seltzer, New Jersey Superior Court, Appellate Division, before joining Archer & Greiner as a litigation partner, where she has practiced for the past fifteen years. At Archer, she has represented clients in a wide range of complex civil litigation disputes in cases involving environmental law, condemnation and eminent domain, securities law, patents, data breaches, mass torts, compliance investigations, and contract disputes, among others.

Maureen serves on the Board of Directors for Cathedral Kitchen, the largest emergency food provider in South Jersey, serving over 350,000 meals annually and providing free culinary arts training for unemployed and at-risk Camden residents. Maureen also serves on the Board for BookSmiles, a non-profit that in 2025 distributed 1.3 million free books to promote childhood literacy and inspire life-long learning.

Maureen and her husband Matt are the proud parents of Kathleen, Tommy, Sean, and Michael. She is also the proud daughter of fellow alumna and retired GC teacher Katharine Crawford Coghlan. The family annually sponsors scholarships in memory of Maureen’s dad and fellow GC Hall of Famer, Dr. David T. Coghlan.

Julie Kain McHenry **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1978**

Education: *Saint Peter's University, 1982*

Career Highlights: *Point Guard on Lady Rams Three Consecutive State Championship Teams, 1976, 1977 and 1978
Dual Sport Athlete at Division I Saint Peter's University
Saint Peter's University Hall of Fame Inductee, 1989
Coached Lady Rams Softball Team to State Titles, 2001. 2003
Gloucester County Times "2001 Coach of the Year"*

It can easily be said that Julie Kain McHenry defines the Gloucester Catholic tradition. Not only she, but also her parents, her seven siblings, her husband, Pat, and her children, Patrick and Cara, all walked the halls of Gloucester Catholic High School as students. To add to that pedigree, after college, Julie returned to her Alma Mater to serve as a teacher, coach and beloved mentor to hundreds of students and Ram athletes. It certainly can be said that Julie Kain McHenry bleeds Maroon and Gold.

As a student-athlete, Julie was the starting point guard on the Lady Rams basketball team that captured three consecutive state championships in 1976, 1977, and 1978. She earned All-Parochial honors in both 1977 and 1978, as well as All-South Jersey honors in 1978. On the softball field, Julie was a three-year starter at both shortstop and third base, again earning All-Parochial honors in 1977 and 1978. Her success at Gloucester Catholic led to a Division I scholarship to Saint Peter's University, where she continued to excel as a dual-sport athlete on both the basketball court and the softball field. In recognition of her outstanding collegiate career, Julie was inducted into the Saint Peter's University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989.

Returning to her Alma Mater in 1996, Julie coached the Lady Rams Softball Team, winning two state titles (2001 and 2003) and four sectional titles (2001, 2002, 2003, and 2006). She also has six Tri-County Conference division titles. As a head coach, Julie won 218 games in 12 seasons and was named "Coach of the Year" by the Gloucester County Times in 2001.

Not only in the athletic arena, but also in the classroom, Julie brings her energy and dedication. For more than twenty years, this talented educator has taught Religious Studies and math to young Rams. Currently a part-time faculty member, she teaches Honors Algebra 1 and Algebra.

With gratitude and pride, the Gloucester Catholic Family salutes Julie Kain McHenry '78 as she continues the rich legacy of the Dominican Tradition and Ram Pride with a new generation of GCHS students.

With an Ivy League education and an impressive resume as a physician, Dr. Chioma Ihunnah Anjou, M.D. remembers where it all began: “I will always be a Ram and think fondly of my memories of Gloucester Catholic.”

Chioma credits the strong academics, AP Biology with Dr. Jay Simmons and math classes with Mrs. Anne Heim and Dr. Tim Briles. She remembers the rigors of Spanish class with Mrs. Diana Flynn that led to her love of the language that she enjoys speaking today. Guidance Counselor Mrs. JoAnn Walsh encouraged Chioma to apply to and attend the competitive New Jersey Governor’s School for the Sciences where she was introduced to the rigors of Organic Chemistry. She also recalls that Mr. Tom Flynn’s English class always started with an amazing prayer. “At the time I didn’t realize the true weight of what he taught us in that prayer. As an adult, I still remember it and appreciate it.”

Chioma’s achievements were also influenced by her college professor parents, the late Dr. Anthony and Dr. Debra Ihunnah. She traveled to Gloucester Catholic, from Glassboro, with her brother, Chibueze ‘03, who earned a PhD in Pharmacology/Toxicology at the University of Pittsburgh and her sister, Chinyere ‘09, who holds a Master’s Degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

Following graduation, as the valedictorian of the Class of 2002, Dr. Anjou attended Princeton University and went on to attend medical school at UMDNJ (now Rutgers) combining dual degrees of an MD from UMDNJ and an MPH with a specialization in Health Policy from Columbia University. With this background, she has traveled to Capitol Hill to work with Congress on issues pertaining to policies that influence patient care, medications and cancer screenings. After medical school, she completed a residency in Internal Medicine at Brown University, followed by a fellowship in Gastroenterology and Hepatology at the University of Connecticut. Upon graduation, she joined Connecticut GI, a gastroenterology practice in the Hartford, Connecticut area,

On the personal side, Chioma reflects on the spiritual. “God is good. I am married and have two children. The jobs of wife and mother are such a blessing to me. I am constantly learning, growing, reevaluating, and so thankful for them. I am a Christian first and foremost”.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

Dom Carrera **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1969**

Education: *Rutgers University, Glassboro State College (now Rowan University)*

Career Highlights: *Star guard at GC who was the school's all-time leading scorer for 56 years. Accepted a basketball scholarship at Rutgers. Transferred to Glassboro State and was one of the best players in school history. He is in now in five Halls of Fame including The South Jersey Basketball HOF, Rowan HOF and now the Gloucester Catholic HOF.*

Reflecting on his well-deserved induction into the Gloucester Catholic Hall of Fame, Dom Carrera doesn't dwell on all those shots he made, all those points he scored or all those games his teams won. He prefers to remember people.

People such as his late, great brother Pete, "the best point guard" in the history of the Gloucester Catholic basketball program and a tenacious one-on-one opponent during the boys' backyard battles in Haddon Heights.

People such as his high school coaches, a pair of South Jersey basketball legends in Ralph Saquella and the late Art DiPatri. "They were outstanding people, not just outstanding coaches," Carrera said. "If I didn't learn basketball from those two guys, then shame on me."

Carrera learned plenty. He put his knowledge to spectacular use during an illustrious career that included a long-standing school record for points and some of the most remarkable shotmaking in the program's history.

Carrera is arguably the best in individual player in Gloucester Catholic boys' basketball history. He scored 1,507 points – a school record that stood from his graduation in 1969 until 2025 – despite playing in an era before the three-point shot.

And it's highly unlikely anybody in a Gloucester Catholic uniform ever made more shots from deep than Carrera, who was Steph Curry-like in his ability to dial from distance.

Carrera was at his best in big games. As a junior, he scored 24 in a South Jersey finals loss to a St. Peter's of New Brunswick team that featured New Jersey scoring legend John Simogyi. As a senior, he scored 29 in a South Jersey finals victory over St. Mary's of South Amboy, despite an injured ankle that "looked like pineapple," according to a newspaper report. In the state final in Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City, Carrera scored 24 in a 54-52 loss to St. Mary's of Jersey City, which took the lead on two free throws with 0:05 on the clock.

Carrera earned a Division 1 scholarship to Rutgers but left the school in New Brunswick and transferred to Glassboro State, where he became a Hall of Famer for the Profs. He's in four other Halls of Fame as well. "This is the last one and this is the most special one," Carrera said. "I started at Gloucester Catholic and now I'm ending at Gloucester Catholic. It's full circle."



HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

Mary Klinewski Cohen **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1981**

Education: *Rutgers University, Glassboro State College (now Rowan University)*

Career Highlights: *A 1st Team, All-South Jersey selection her senior year at GC. She averaged over 20 points per game to lead the Lady Rams to a State Title. She finished her high school career with 1,211 points. Accepted a basketball scholarship at the University of South Florida. She is in the school's record book for points and rebounds.*

Mary Klinewski Cohen was the best player on one of the best girls' basketball teams in Gloucester Catholic history, a deep and talented squad that went 28-1 and won the Group 1 state championship in 1981.

But like so many top athletes before her, Klinewski Cohen doesn't cherish the memory of the victories on the court as much as the camaraderie with her teammates and the culture of the school community.

"I was blessed from the time I first walked on that campus," said Klinewski Cohen, who will be honored as a member of the 2026 class of the Gloucester Catholic Hall of Fame. "It's something you might not fully appreciate at the time, but when you look back you realize just how lucky you were to have those kinds of people around you."

Klinewski Cohen was a top athlete who was an All-South Jersey selection in both basketball and track, as a javelin thrower. She joined with her twin sister Cathy as well as teammates such as Maggie Kupcha and Trish McNutt to lead the Rams to a dream season in 1981, culminating with a 58-33 win over North Jersey champion Benedictine in the state final. "I had so much support," Klinewski Cohen said. "It's a team sport."

Klinewski Cohen was remarkably consistent as a senior, scoring in double figures in 28 of 29 games and averaging 20.9 points. She finished her career with 1,211 points.

Klinewski Cohen played four years at the University of South Florida, where she set more than a dozen school records and earned All-Sun Belt honors.

Klinewski Cohen's husband, former Gloucester Catholic coach Jeff Cohen, was an inspirational figure to his family and friends. He persevered through multiple battles with cancer before passing away in 2022.

Klinewski Cohen lives in Palm City, Fla. She has been a teacher and coach and remains an active athlete, still competing in distance races. And she traces many of the blessings in her life to her days at Gloucester Catholic. "It's such a special place," Klinewski Cohen said. "It's like the saying, 'Once a Ram, Always a Ram.' Just knowing now when I experienced back then, I always say we were the lucky ones."



HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE PROFILE

Kevin Nolan **Gloucester Catholic Class of 1978**

Education: *Glassboro State College*

Career Highlights: *Compiled a 436-141-1 record during 35 seasons as the Gloucester Catholic head swimming coach; guided the Rams to four state championship appearances; coached three individual state champions.*

Kevin Nolan jokes that most people refer to the Gloucester City Swim Club as “the one you can see from the bridge.” For Nolan, however, it represents so much more. Located just a block and a half from his childhood home, that pool is where he spent just about every summer day, where he fell in love with swimming, and ultimately where he got his start in an outstanding coaching career that continues to this day.

When Nolan was a student at Gloucester Catholic in the 1970s, the school did not have a swimming program, so he competed for his local club in the Suburban League until the age of 18. The next summer his coach, Bob Horvath, asked him to return as an assistant, and he’s basically been roaming pool decks across the state ever since.

Following his education at Glassboro State College, Nolan eventually came back to Gloucester Catholic as a science teacher, and Horvath again recruited him to serve as his assistant, this time with the school’s new swimming program. In 1987, he succeeded his mentor as head coach, a position he went on to hold for 35 years.

During that incredible run, Nolan established Gloucester Catholic as one of South Jersey’s premier programs, leading the Rams to four state final appearances, coaching three individual state champions and compiling a stellar 436-141-1 record. But those accolades are not what stand out when he reflects on his tenure.

“To me, it was all about the kids I got to work with,” he said. “Seeing how they’ve done after swimming and how successful they’ve been in life is really what I look back on the most.

“I run into them all over the place—some are swim coaches, some are parents—and it’s just great to see how well they’re all doing. Between teaching and coaching, that’s what has always been important to me. There are races that stick out in my mind and kids who won state championships, but overall thinking about the program and how well it did all of those years is the biggest thing to me.”

Nolan stayed on as the coach at Gloucester Catholic even as his teaching career took him elsewhere, first to Penns Grove and then to Deptford. He enjoyed continuing the winning tradition he established, but more importantly the family culture.

Recently retired after 41 years of teaching, the father of two and grandfather of one is currently an assistant coach for the Jersey Wahoos, a renowned club team, working under his longtime assistant with the Rams, Nancy Curtis Pegues.

Nolan humbly credits Horvath for starting his coaching journey, his alma mater for all of its support over the years, and the swimmers and divers he coached for following his lead.

“The Gloucester Catholic community,” he said, “is just different.”

Gloucester Catholic 2007 Golf

Coach: *Beth Maguire-Quinn*

Season Highlights: *25-0 record; No. 1 final ranking in South Jersey and the state; second straight Non-Public B state championship; Tournament of Champions title, the only team in school history to accomplish the feat in any sport.*

Key Players: *PJ Tighe and Ryan Cass*

As the golf coach at Gloucester Catholic for more than 20 years, Beth Maguire-Quinn understands that in most seasons, her teams are not going to compare to the perennial powerhouses from the top half of the state.

Back in 2007, however, in just her second year on the job, she had a squad that was as fearless as it was talented. And no opponent, from anywhere, was going to get in its way.

In that remarkable season, Gloucester Catholic compiled a perfect 25-0 record, finished as the No. 1 team in New Jersey in the Star-Ledger poll, and won the Tournament of Champions (TOC), featuring the best teams from every group in the state. No other team from GC has ever won the TOC, in any sport.

“It’s so hard competing against those North Jersey schools, because their kids grow up playing on private courses and they’ve all had lessons since they were young,” Quinn said. “But little Gloucester Catholic, down here in South Jersey, pulled it off. I love it—it’s such a great story.”

Quinn, a 1979 graduate, played field hockey, basketball and softball at Gloucester Catholic and didn’t become a competitive golfer until her college years. When she returned to the school as a teacher, long-time golf coach Gerry Scharff asked her to help out as an assistant, and she leapt at the opportunity.

Just before the 2006 season, Scharff stepped down, and he passed away about a year later. Quinn was entrusted with leading the program and actually guided the Rams to a state championship in her rookie season before repeating and taking things a step further with the TOC in 2007.

“I kind of lucked into this whole situation, just because I happened to be in the right place at the right time,” she said. “In my heart of hearts, I think the kids were doing this for Gerry.”

Ryan Cass, one of two key standouts on the team along with PJ Tighe, gives Quinn more credit than she gives herself.

“She’s such a good person and she was like the mother hen,” he said. “She was put in charge of a bunch of immature high school boys, so I’m sure it was a tall task for her.”

The 2007 TOC, which also served as the state championships, was held at Burlington Country Club, and Quinn used a connection with some members there to get her team on the course for a practice round ahead of the tournament. When the day arrived, the Rams finished with a team score of 315, four strokes better than runner-up Princeton. Tighe led the way with a 76, followed by Cass (77), Zach Song (78) and Steve Dougherty (84).

“We had a good group of guys who happened to be the same age and we all fed off each other,” Cass said. “PJ had a lot of talent and he was so good, and all of the role players were really good golfers too. We just had a blast together.”

Gloucester Catholic 1979 Football Team

Coach: Tom Iacovone

Highlights: *Compiled a 10-1 overall record, beating many top opponents in South Jersey including a 13-7 win over arch-rival Bishop Eustace for the Group B Championship. Finished the season as No. 5 in the Courier-Post final rankings.*

Key Players: *Chuck Casella, John Yowler, Mike Barnes, Frank Santoro and John Bidini among others.*

Chuck Casella took the long way home, racing from one side of the field to the other for the game-winning touchdown that rainy day at Edgewood High.

“We used to joke that he ran 70 yards for a two-yard TD,” said Tom Iacovone, coach of the 1979 Gloucester Catholic football team, just the third gridiron squad to be inducted in the school’s Hall of Fame. Let Casella’s run serve as a symbol of the team’s progress, since many of those Rams made the long and winding journey over their four-year careers at the school to finally break through and produce one of the best seasons in the history of the program.

“We were senior-dominated and that was the finish of four years of building,” Iacovone said. Led by Casella as well as fellow seniors such as John Yowler, Mike Barnes, Frank Santoro, John Bidini, Mike Neilio, Anthony Pacifico and many others, the Rams went 10-1 and earned the No. 5 spot in the Courier-Post’s final South Jersey rankings. They won the title in the Olympic Conference National Division. And they won the South Jersey Parochial B championship game by a 13-7 score over arch-rival Bishop Eustace in typical fashion, with dominant defense and big-play heroics from Casella.

“A special team, a special group of guys,” said Barnes, a two-way lineman and captain. Casella ran for 15 touchdowns and threw for another five on halfback passes. Yowler displayed superb ball skills as an offensive playmaker and defensive back. Barnes and Bidini anchored the lines and Santoro led a seasoned, sturdy defense.

Iacovone credited the team’s senior leadership as well as the influence of top assistant coach Frank Ward with setting the tone during a special season. And they all remember that torrential downpour in Atco, where the mud was ankle deep and the Rams were facing a fourth-and-goal late in a scoreless game with powerful Edgewood and the coach thought of trying a field goal.

“Our center didn’t think he could get the ball back, it was so heavy,” Iacovone said. “Everybody said, ‘Let’s just run 25 Power one more time.’ And I can still see Chuck going from one side of the field to the other and diving into the end zone.”

Gloucester Catholic 1973 Girls Basketball

Coach: *Bert Nolan*

Highlights: *Compiled a 22-0 overall record. Won the very first New Jersey State Championship NJ for girls' basketball. Finished the season ranked No.1 in the state.*

All-South Jersey Debut Players: *Mickey McGlade and Theresa Yeager.*

They were No. 1 in more ways than one. They were the top team in the state, undefeated champions of New Jersey's initial state tournament in girls' basketball. They also were first in a long line of state champions in the sport in Gloucester Catholic High School history.

"We were ahead of our time," said Mickey McGlade, a senior star on the 1973 girls' basketball team that will be inducted in the school's Hall of Fame. Led by McGlade and Terry Yeager – both of whom were first-team selections to the inaugural All-South Jersey squad in the sport, still another first – the Rams went 22-0. They captured New Jersey's first state tournament in girls' basketball, which featured just one group that included public and parochial schools of all enrollments.

The team also featured seniors JoAnn Potts, Janine McGinness and Patti Matlock, among other stand-outs. They were led by legendary coach Bert Nolan, a pioneer in girls' athletics. McGlade was the oldest of four sisters who starred at Gloucester Catholic and became synonymous with the sport at the school through the 1970s, when the Rams were the state's most prominent program.

McGlade averaged 18.6 points as a senior and scored 1,221 in her career. Yeager averaged 15.4 points. The Rams won the South Jersey crown by rallying in the fourth quarter for a 49-42 victory over a Paul VI team that was led by the late, great Mary Scharff. "That was a huge rivalry," said McGlade, who along with Scharff was credited with helping to usher the girls' game in South Jersey into the modern era.

The Rams beat Toms River South 30-28 in the state semifinals, then took down Paramus Catholic 51-42 to win the first state championship in New Jersey girls' basketball history as Matlock led the way with 19 points and 11 rebounds.

All the glory that was to follow – the similarly undefeated 1974 team that also won a one-group state tournament, the seasons-spanning unbeaten streak, the multiple state crowns – sprang in large part from the success of that first championship team in 1973.

"You don't remember scores," McGlade said. "You remember winning, and the camaraderie with your teammates, and singing on the bus on our way to games and singing on our way home."
